CITIZEN PARTICIPATION FOR NON-AGENDA ITEMS (5-minute time limit per person):

1. Jeannie Thomas, Department of Human Services and Child Welfare: This month is also Prevent Child Abuse Awareness Month. We have pins and pinwheels to show your support and you can also wear blue.
2. Nancy Bennett, SECCP: (The Plaza Building might be done this August.) Last week, Southeast Colorado Creative Partnership was awarded the Stephen H. Hart Award by History Colorado for the Plaza Block. The Hart award is to recognize Colorado’s great history through outstanding archaeology and historic preservation projects. It celebrates and recognizes exemplary projects in archaeology and historic preservation across the state.

REPORTS

- A. **Emergent Enforcement Solutions (Russell W. Sarpy).** Is a custom speed enforcement program that can be suited to your municipalities needs. This difference between this company and other vendors is that the municipality owns the software as long as the contractual agreement is in force as opposed to others where they own everything. The contract includes the online payment portal, mail

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center, use of equipment, training services, and storage of videos. No payments are required up front. The company invests between \$10,000-\$12,000 for start-up. The company provides a handheld lidar camera to the police department. The best way to measure and determine whether or not this system is a fit for our municipality it to put the officers out there and educate the public. You can transition anytime from an officer utilizing the gun to a fixed pole or mobile speed trailer. The gun is more proficient than an actual speed camera because an officer has the ability to work two directions and can manipulate it better than a fixed position. (Discussion continued amongst the board.)

- B. Motor Pool/Vehicle Use (City Manager Hart).** The City's vehicle policy was needing re-vamped. A draft was emailed to the council today. Some feedback was received and will be incorporated into the policy. It's a document to protect our city as well as our employees giving the do's and don'ts. The next step in the process is identifying how many vehicles we have, which ones are good, which ones are bad, and what can be considered surplus.

CIRSA (City's insurance carrier) has told us that anybody within the vehicle, whether a city employee, family member, or someone off the street, are covered if an accident occurs. However, if we have people that are in there that are not for city business and the city has to pay out, premiums are going to go up. We're trying to figure out what's an authorized and unauthorized person. The way it came to me was that there were city employees picking up or taking their kids to school in city vehicles and why are the tax payers paying for this. We are currently putting city emblems on all city vehicles, except for three unmarked police vehicles.

- C. Economic Development (City Manager Hart).** This is still ongoing. I'm looking back at the original Articles of Incorporation from 1988 and seeing if they are still applicable today. If not, do we amend them, scrap them and start over? We need to figure out what the council wants in regards to Economic Development so that we're all moving together in the same direction.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS**A. Property Management Fund Audit Update.**

City Attorney Harris: What we discussed on the resolution, we talked about a budget of nothing more than \$8,000 used to fund some kind of audit. One of the reasons for that was because we knew that would be enough money to cover the deductible that CIRSA would charge us if they were going to do such an audit. In my conversations with them, they explained that they don't do things like audits. They only investigate an accusation of something. The resolution was saying, do we have enough information so that the council is informed about this enterprise fund. It's not an accusation that something was going wrong. The way that conversation closed was this is not something that CIRSA can do, find an independent auditor. It would require a lot of extra money that we would be spending to do something that could be done locally, in-house. Recognizing that there are people here within the city that know a great deal about what's happening with property management. The information that I provided to Michael and to Joe was that if we can't do a CIRSA "audit", then how do we want to proceed, recognizing that the resolution had a limited budget and a request that used that word. I would like some discussion concerning the next direction to take and whether that's something that, we might have Mr. Hart feeling us in on what the other options might be if we can't use CIRSA. I believe part of the rest of the resolution indicated that Mr. Hart would be responsible for that.

City Manager Hart: What it boils down to, since CIRSA is out, do we still seek a third party to come in and do this and if so, what's the cost going to be on that given the scope that we're trying to look at here. The other option is internally. We give them the scope of work, what we're looking for and then turn them loose and go from there.

(Discussion amongst the board continued.)

City Attorney Harris: Have had multiple conversations with Aliza about the lodging tax. It seems that it was passed just for tourism funds but what we started doing is we may have particular projects in mind that are the only ones. Primarily, that money goes through the tourism board but it may be that the tourism board is under the belief they are legally obligated to make certain decisions about it and that may not in fact be true. There isn't anything specific besides saying that it needs to be tourism projects. It does sound like, over the years, we have developed a belief that there were particular large scale goals that were part of that. Some of the projects we have in mind, especially when they're large building project, require a lot of planning ahead of time. Years and years in order to be on particular lists, to do considered for certain grants, to have enough money in the coffers to provide the match, was always the dialogue that was going on at the time. It may be that all of us benefit by looking back at what the rules really are to decide whether we are in a rut that was based on prior dialogue or whether we are really following the rules as they are.

6. Urban Renewal (Mayor Ayala):

ORDINANCE NO. 1677

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LA JUNTA, COLORADO REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTER 10.04 OF THE LA JUNTA MUNICIPAL CODE AND ADOPTING A NEW CHAPTER 10.04 OF THE LA JUNTA MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADOPT THE 2024 EDITION OF THE MODEL TRAFFIC CODE

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule authority and Section 31-15-401, C.R.S., for purposes of promoting health, safety, morals and the general welfare of the community, the City Council has the authority to create laws that prevent and suppress activities that could prove harmful to the health, safety and welfare of its citizens, and pass and enforce all necessary police ordinances; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule authority and Section 31-15-702(1)(a)(I), C.R.S., the City is authorized to regulate the use of streets; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 42-1-102(48), C.R.S., the City is defined as a “local authority” having the authority to adopt local police regulations under the constitution and laws of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 42-4-110(1)(b), C.R.S., the City Council may adopt by reference all or any part of a model traffic code that embodies the rules of the road and vehicle requirements set forth in Article 4 of Title 42, C.R.S.; and

WHEREAS, the City previously adopted the 2010 edition of the Model Traffic Code promulgated by the Colorado Department of Transportation by reference in its entirety, and

WHEREAS, the Colorado Department of Transportation has promulgated a 2024 edition of the Model Traffic Code which has been reviewed by City staff, which updates the Model Traffic Code to comport with changes in state law; and

WHEREAS, City staff recommends adoption of the 2024 edition of the Model Traffic Code; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the residents, taxpayers, and visitors of the City to adopt the 2024 edition of the Model Traffic Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LA JUNTA, COLORADO, ORDAINS:

Section 1. Repeal of Chapter 10.04 of the La Junta Municipal Code.

Chapter 10.04 of the La Junta Municipal Code is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 2. Adoption of a new Chapter 10.04 of the La Junta Municipal Code.

A new Chapter 10.04 of the La Junta Municipal Code is adopted hereby to read as follows:

TITLE 10 - Vehicles and Traffic

CHAPTER 10.04 - Model Traffic Code

10.04.010 - Adoption.

There is hereby adopted by reference the revised 2024 edition of the *Model Traffic Code for Colorado*, promulgated and published as such by the Colorado Department of Transportation, Traffic Engineering and Safety Branch, 2829 W. Howard Place, Denver, Colorado 80204. The subject matter of the *Model Traffic Code* relates primarily to comprehensive traffic control regulations for the City. The purpose of this Article adopted herein is to provide a system of traffic regulations consistent with state law and generally conforming to similar regulations throughout the state and the nation.

10.04.015 -Copies on File.

Three (3) copies of the *Model Traffic Code* are now filed in the office of the City Clerk and may be inspected during regular business hours.

10.04.025 - Amendments.

The Model Traffic Code is adopted as if set out at length, save and except the following amendments:

- (1) The Model Traffic Code is amended with the following deletions which are declared to be inapplicable to this municipality and therefore expressly deleted:
 - (a) The classification of an offense in any subsection of the Model Traffic Code as a class A or class B traffic infraction is amended to classify such offense as a traffic infraction without reference to class A or class B.
 - (b) The classification of an offense in any subsection of the Model Traffic Code as a petty offense is amended to classify the offense as a traffic infraction.

10.04.030 - Interpretation.

This Chapter shall be so interpreted and construed as to effectuate its general purpose to conform with the State's uniform system for the regulation of vehicles and traffic. Article and section headings of this Chapter and adopted Model Traffic Code

shall not be deemed to govern, limit, modify or in any manner affect the scope, meaning or extent of the provisions of any article or section thereof.

10.04.040 - Application.

This Chapter shall apply to every street, alley, sidewalk area, driveway, park and every other public way, public place or public parking area, either within or outside the corporate limits of the City, the use of which the City has jurisdiction and authority to regulate. The provisions of Sections 1401, 1402, and 1413 of the adopted Model Traffic Code, respectively concerning reckless driving, careless driving, and eluding a police officer, shall apply not only to public places and ways, but also throughout the City.

10.04.050 - Penalties.

Except as provided in Section 1208(9) of the Model Traffic Code, the following penalties, herewith set forth in full, shall apply to this Chapter:

(1) It is unlawful for any person to violate any of the provisions adopted in this Chapter.

(2) Every person convicted of a violation of any provision adopted in this Chapter shall be punished by a fine not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), or by imprisonment not to exceed one hundred eighty (180) days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

10.04.060. - Validity.

If any part or parts of this Article or the adopted code are for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Article or the adopted code. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Article, the adopted code, and each part thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one (1) part is declared invalid.

10.04.070. - Enforcement.

Law enforcement personnel of the City or any entity with whom the City contracts to provide law enforcement services, the Oter County Sheriff's Office, and the Colorado State Patrol are authorized to implement and enforce the provisions of this Article.
